This year, the Ribota Brothers faced limitations due to the Covid-19 pandemic that has affected so many from gathering. So they decided to do a lemonade stand/garage sale in their neighborhood with hopes to do what they can for the non-profit.

"I just want my boys to understand that giving back to their community is very important," said Gina Ribota, mother. "Three years ago, they wanted to do a lemonade stand and we decided to donate the funds to Hospice of the Calumet Area. My friend works for the organization and I'm always impressed with the work they do for patients, families and the community."

This year, the boys were able to make \$100 dollars at the sale, which was tripled by checks sent in by anonymous donors.
