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#### True to Our Core Values

ospice of the Calumet Area (HCA)'s mission is to improve the quality of life through compassionate care for individuals and families facing life-limiting illness. It is all about Cherishing Life and as we began our 41st year of service to our community, this did not change. From our volunteers, staff, to our donors, our people remain our strength.

Quality and innovation have been hallmarks of Hospice of the Calumet Area, and these were a constant in 2022. Once again, we were recognized by HEALTHCAREfirst with Hospice Honors for our exceptional satisfaction scores. We achieved a 5-Star rating from the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid. The star rating system for hospice providers was new in 2022. HCA was the only hospice provider in our area to achieve a 5-Star rating with the initial publication.

HCA remained true to its core value of caring for individuals and families regardless of their ability to pay. This was one of the first values instituted by the original Board of Directors before insurances covered hospice care, and it remains part of HCA's uniqueness and culture. This commitment extends not only to hospice care but also to our free Transitions Program, now in its 21st year, and care at our in-patient hospice care facility, the William J. Riley Memorial Residence (WJR).

In 2022, we celebrated WJR's 25th anniversary. The first patient was admitted to WJR in August 1997. He was a young man with no insurance whose elderly mother was unable to care for him in her home.

It was the reason our Board of Directors was committed to providing this specialized care in our community. We remain committed to it 25 years later.

Over 5,500 individuals have received all or a portion of their hospice care at WJR. They have referred to it as a blessing and a haven of comfort and peace.

It is heartwarming to hear the stories of those who have benefited from the care their loved one received at WJR. One gentleman shared his story and support for this special care in a testimonial for the Indiana legislature in the early days of in-patient hospice facilities. He shared that he didn't know what he didn't know until the care needs for his mother evolved and he realized he could not provide the needed care at home. He said that whenever he is awake in the middle of the night, he thinks of the WJR staff, caring for those in need. And he has indeed continued to think about the WJR staff and volunteers by bringing baked goods every year at Christmas in appreciation for what they do. His commitment, along with all the other volunteers who care for patients, plant flowers, knit comfort blankets, or a multitude of other things that make WJR special.

Like any 25-year-old home, WJR needs major infrastructure updates. To preserve WJR as a premier in-patient hospice care facility without jeopardizing our core value regarding all our direct care programs, we launched a \$1 million Honoring Legacies Capital Campaign to maintain the integrity, safety and comfort of WJR for the next 25 years. ### Volunteers Make a Difference

n 2022, Hospice of the Calumet Area volunteers contributed 13,094 hours of service, which led to an organizational financial savings of \$386,805.

HCA has nearly 500 active volunteers, who package supplies, visit patients, attend memorial services, perform office work, plan events, fundraise, create and sell art and more.

In 2022, the Friends of Hospice, the fundraising auxiliary of HCA, raised \$100,000 to support the organization's Cherishing Life efforts.

"This was a milestone year for the Friends of Hospice," said Courtney Markovich, president. "What began 40 years ago, as a small group of individuals volunteering their time and talent, is now more than 250 Friends. We remain fully committed to supporting the mission of Hospice of the Calumet Area to serve individuals and families facing life-limiting illnesses."



"We have so many loved ones to remember and this is a wonderful opportunity to celebrate them," said VanVleet.


"This job is so inspiring because we build relationships with the most amazing patients and families and it's so wonderful to keep their memories alive and well in our hearts. This is an incredible day."

n the fall, when speaking to a group of supporters at our Honoring Legacies Capital Campaign kickoff, Hospice of the Calumet Area CEO Adrianne May recalled opening the doors of our William J. Riley Memorial Residence (WJR) 25 years ago.

"One of my very first tasks was to get the doors open," said May. "I remember wanting to make sure everything was perfect before we did that. I received a call from a social worker asking when are we going to open because she had a patient in his mid-40's, and his elderly mother couldn't provide the care needed at their home."

Weeks before the projected opening date, HCA sprung into action and admitted its first patient the next day at WJR in August of 1997.

"It's a unique place with so many wonderful memories over the years," said May. "We are proud to offer a home-like setting to our patients and families. Our commitment to offer 5-star expert hospice care, regardless of ability to pay, has remained consistent."

Since its opening in 1997, more than 5,500 patients have received this special 24-hour brand of care at the WJR. The facility has hosted anniversary celebrations, weddings, birthday parties for patients and families that wanted their loved one to be part of cherished family memories.

Lydia Dershewitz has been volunteering at the WJR for over two decades and she remembers a patient who seemed to be ignoring her as she took his dinner order.

"He then turned to me with the greatest smile and said, 'this is the most beautiful place I have ever lived,' and I was so touched by his joy," Dershewitz said. "I'll never forget him."

Three years ago, when patient Dan Viktora told his daughter that he just wanted to take one last look at his motorcycle, an HCA RN called the Marketing Department immediately. In less than two hours, Harley Davidson of Calumet parked Dan's identical motorcycle outside his beautiful picture window for him to see.

"This was such a beautiful act of compassion," said Nicole Stout, Dan's daughter. "Helping patients and families cherish every moment is what sets Hospice of the Calumet Area apart."
