A Message from our CEO and board President

Hospice of the Calumet Area (HCA) is proud to be recognized by the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) as the only 5-Star, nonprofit hospice in our community. A 5-star rating indicates a high level of patient and family caregiver satisfaction and reflects HCA's commitment to our Cherishing Life philosophy of care.

Our mission is rooted in the belief that every life has meaning and every moment holds value. This philosophy guides every aspect of our work, from care of pre-hospice Transitions clients to hospice patients and their families to be reavement care for HCA families and community members in need of grief support. We care for individuals of all ages and illnesses, not just those with cancer. Patients ranged from 28 to 106 years old during 2024, with over half having diverse illnesses such as Parkinson's, Alzheimer's, heart disease or breathing disorders.

Despite increased awareness of hospice, many still have not heard the word or mistakenly associate it with giving up or being only for the last few days of life. In reality, hospice is designed to support patients and their families throughout the last six months of life, providing physical, emotional and spiritual care. These misunderstandings come at a cost - denying patients and their families the full scope of comfort, dignity and peace they deserve in this sacred chapter of life.

Our interdisciplinary team focuses on the unique goal that each patient and family have for their hospice care, and we work aggressively to help them attain their goals. In addition to the use of traditional medications to bring comfort, we also use alternate therapies, such as pet therapy and music therapy to

ease pain, reduce anxiety and facilitate family sharing and connections. Care at our inpatient hospice house, the William J. Riley Memorial Residence, is another benefit for those in our care who can no longer be safely cared for in their own home. During 2024, 217 people called the William J. Riley Memorial Residence home for all or a portion of their care.

Transitions is our support program that provides valuable education about care options and links to community resources for those not hospice ready or eligible. HCA has been providing this program free of charge in our community since 2001. Education is central to the care of clients in this program.

Education is an essential piece in our vision of bringing care, compassion and comfort for all facing a life-limiting illness, regardless of ability to pay. Through radio shows, community outreach and partnerships and collaboration with healthcare providers, we are making that vision a reality. This commitment also is reflected in the \$3.6 million in charity, discounted and uncompensated care we provided in 2024.

Many in our community still don't know where to turn in their time of need. With your continued support, we can bring comfort, care, and compassion to more families facing lifelimiting illness. Thank you for helping us Cherish Life.



Volunteers: Cherishing Life Through Service

At HCA, compassion isn't just part of our care—it's at the very core. In 2024, that compassion came to life through 373 volunteers who gave more than 18,883 hours of their time. Their service provided not just an estimated \$633,416 in savings, but dignity and comfort.

Our volunteers pack supplies for patients they'll never meet, offer silent strength at memorial services, sit at bedsides with calming voices and lend their creativity to raise vital funds.

In 2024, we celebrated Lydia Dershewitz, whose 25 years of service at our William J. Riley Memorial Residence have made her a constant, steady light for patients and families. Lydia's compassion is quiet but powerful—whether she's holding the hand of a patient or guiding a grieving family with gentle reassurance. As Project Director of the Hospice Artisans, Lydia has a remarkable gift for uniting people through creativity. The one-of-a-kind pieces they create, which include jewelry, cards, woodwork and art, carry stories of hope and healing. In 2024, their efforts raised over \$58,000 to support our mission.

HCA also honored Mike Buchanan, a Vietnam veteran who has spent the past two decades assembling admission packets every Friday preparing the first resource that families receive. Also, with his loyal Caring Canine therapy dog, Chloe, Mike and his wife, Becky, bring joy and comfort, to hospital rooms and hospice bedsides.

Last November, when HCA Marketing Director Damian Rico's 8-year-old daughter, Monica, still grieving the loss of her grandfather, struggled during her school's Veterans Day ceremony, Mike quietly stepped in. Mike stood proudly in her grandfather's place—giving her someone to salute, someone to hug, someone to honor. And when Monica's brother, Anthony, played Taps on his trumpet, Mike stood tall with tears in his eyes, not just as a veteran, but as an adopted grandfather, helping grieving children find peace and comfort.


"Lydia and Mike are more than volunteers," Damian said. "They are the embodiment of what it means to Cherish Life. Their compassion inspires and guides us."







The celebration begins with Laura Arcella, a beloved HCA certified nursing assistant, who organizes a special holiday meal for patients and their families. Then, the Sunday after Thanksgiving, a dedicated team of volunteers arrives to transform the residence into a winter wonderland, spreading holiday cheer throughout the halls.

"This is definitely one of my favorite ways to start the holidays," said Arcella. "Every year, we worry about having enough resources, but the generosity of our partners and volunteers is always so

inspiring. We've been doing this for over 20 years, and it's a beautiful reminder of what the season is about."

At the heart of this annual transformation is a trio of former Purdue engineering students—Chad Hunter, Scott Schaller and Oscar Munoz—who have led the decorating efforts for 25 years. Their enduring efforts and generosity continue to inspire and uplift the HCA team and the community, serving as a heartfelt reminder of the power of cherishing life.



A Heartfelt Goodbye: First Presbyterian Church Leaves a Legacy of Love

When longtime pastor Rev. Linda Skaggs learned that Hammond's First Presbyterian Church would be closing its doors after decades of ministry, her heart sank. The church had been a beacon of faith, service and community for generations.

But that heartbreak quickly transformed into hope and pride when she was asked to lead a bold and compassionate farewell effort: distributing over \$1.3 million to local nonprofits that reflect the church's mission and values.

"I was very proud of our board and leadership for wanting to go out with a bang," said Skaggs.
"For 35 years, our very mission was to minister our faith into the heart of our community and impact as many as we could along the way. Our church may have been small, but our vision and commitment were always large."

"It's bittersweet but I know we're ending just as we lived—by lifting others," Skaggs said.

Hospice of the Calumet Area CEO Adrianne May recalls the moment she received a call from Pastor

Skaggs—a moment she describes as nothing short of divine timing. "We were facing some urgent technology and infrastructure challenges," said May. "That call from Linda came at exactly the right time. Her message wasn't just about generosity—it was about trust, impact and hope."

Presbyterian Church, HCA was able to
invest in much-needed upgrades,
including iPads, a commercial
shredder and dining chairs for each of
their eight suites, supporting the care
and connection patients and families
rely on each day.

"It's more than a donation," said May.
"It was a lifeline—one that will
continue to empower our mission."

Through this final act of giving, the church supported organizations like Hospice of the Calumet Area, the NWI Food Bank, St. Joseph's Soup Kitchen, Phil's Friends, Opportunity Enterprises, Haven House, Humane Indiana, Meals on Wheels, Northwest Cancer Centers Foundation and the Salvation Army, to name a few, ensuring that their spirit of service lives on in the lives of those in need.

Partners in Compassion: Serving with a Purpose, Sustaining with Dignity and Love


